Types of hearing loss



There are two main types of hearing loss. People can have one or both.

Sensori-neural hearing loss

This is caused by damage to the hair cells in the inner ear, or damage to the hearing nerve, or both.

It makes it more difficult to hear quiet sounds and also reduces the quality of sound that you can hear.

Sensorineural hearing loss is permanent but can often be addressed with hearing aids and other assistive devices.

Conductive hearing loss

This is generally a condition of the middle ear, the eardrum, and potentially also (on a temporary basis) with excessive ear wax blockage in the ear canal - which can be removed easily.

Sounds will become quieter, and things might sound muffled. Potentially middle ear hearing loss may be addressed surgically but hearing aids can help too.




Hearing loss and the ear



Age related hearing loss is typically the most common type, followed by noise induced hearing loss and then other causes of hearing loss.

Most people will suffer some hearing loss due to the ageing process through life – it's more common to encounter hearing loss in the workplace than you might imagine.

Your hearing starts to drop from your early twenties and typically you lose the higher frequencies first, leading first to a gradual lack of clarity in speech.





Tinnitus



Tinnitus can sound like:


- Ringing
- Buzzing
- Whooshing
- Humming
- Hissing
- Throbbing
- Music or singing

You may hear these sounds in one or both ears, and only you can hear them. Tinnitus may come and go, or you might hear them all the time. Tinnitus for some people can become unbearable.





- Replacing one sound with a more pleasing sound can mask the sound of tinnitus.
- Tinnitus 1 to 1 strategies
- No actual cure for tinnitus
- Management of the symptoms rather than searching for a cure tends to work best






Hearing loss assessments

- Colleague deaf/hearing impaired awareness







- Event and group meeting portable room kits














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
